On Wednesday morning, May 11th an elite IDF unit entered the Jenin refugee camp to arrest a member of the Islamic Jihad who was supposedly planning an imminent act of terror from that site. According to an IDF spokesperson, during the operation Israeli forces came under heavy fire and were targeted by IEDs. Abu Akleh and about four other journalists, all wearing vests that identified themselves as PRESS in large letters, entered Jenin that same morning where the Israeli forces were battling militants at three separate locations. The journalists were said to be several hundred feet

away from Israeli forces and watching the aforementioned raid on the Palestinian home in question. As gunshots rang out the journalists sought cover but Abu Akleh appeared to be already shot. Videos from the scene didn't show the exact moment when the bullet hit Akleh or who fired it. During an autopsy performed at a Palestinian forensic institute a fragment of the bullet was removed from her head but there has been no way to identify who fired it. To complicate matters further both sides were using M16 rifles but without testing individual rifles an ID could not likely be made.

Israelis asked to be present at the autopsy and they were denied.

They asked to examine the bullet and were denied.

The IDF called for a joint investigation and were refused.

Without both sides having equal access to critical evidence, both sides mistrusting each other, and no compromise in sight, the search for clues as to what really happened is at a standstill. For now the real doctors are shedding no light on the situation but the spin doctors seem to be in full control.

By the way, both Palestinians and Israelis expressed their sorrow and regret that Ms. Akleh was killed.

The IDF released a video and according to its Arabic-language spokesman Avichay Adraee who tweeted, "It seems- according to initial assessments - that she was hit by Palestinian gunfire and not IDF fire." Five frames are shown below with the following translation.
