"In memory of my family members who were lost in the Holocaust I am grateful to be receiving this award. I remember as a child asking my mother, of blessed memory, why there were pictures unframed hanging in our home in Rockland County. My mother sat me down as a child and explained to me these pictures were painted by our relatives on the rear of gift boxes who perished in the Holocaust but were smuggled out and then left for our family. That memory stays with me 35+ years later.

It is so critically important as our prior speakers, Rabbi Cohen and the County Executives said about these antisemitic groups we always have to be prepared to fight against.

During the past several decades, Parker Jewish Institute cared for Holocaust survivors both as in patient and community patients in our local communities in Nassau County. It has meant a lot to us to care for these individuals.
